Notes from Ceridwen's Womb

Explain the Inexplicable by Laurence Main



hen it comes to ancient monuments, don't always expect answers from archaeologists. You have to cast your net wide to find truth. There's no better example of this than Avebury in Wiltshire, including Silbury Hill.



Are you old enough to remember the Silbury Hill Project on BBC television from 1967 to 1969? Described as one of the most exciting researches ever undertaken in British archaeology, it starred Professor Richard Atkinson and involved commentator Magnus Magnusson. For younger readers, this was big stuff, gripping the nation until the final anti-climax.

The archaeologists couldn't find the answer! They had no idea why the biggest artificial mound in Britain had been constructed some 4675 years ago. It took a dogged individual unencumbered by academic blinkers to find the truth.

In the 1970's, when I was teaching at schools in Swindon, Michael Dames was a college lecturer in the same Wiltshire town. His subject was art. His degrees were in Geography and British Archaeology and he looked at the sacred landscape south of Swindon through eyes blessed by the Goddess. Whilst I was inspecting the rights of way as the

voluntary Footpaths Secretary of the Swindon Group of the Ramblers' Association in the drought summer of 1976, Michael Dames was publishing a book which provided the answer to the enigma on our patch, Silbury Hill.

Read *The Silbury Treasure* by Michael Dames (Thames and Husdon, 1976). This was followed by *The Avebury Cycle* (Thames and Hudson, 1977). Authors die, books go out of print, and information is lost. Be grateful to be able to read them.


Michael Dames shows how our Neolithic ancestors worshipped the Mother Goddess and represented Her in the landscape. The various monuments in the Avebury area represent a different aspect of the annual fertility cycle corresponding to the agricultural year. Silbury Hill is the pregnant belly of Lughnasadh. The first farmers lived in harmony with the living landscape. *The Silbury Treasure* is a vision of lost unity.

Individuals such as Michael Dames are seen as embarrassments to the




'authorities' (who prefer to dig tunnels on TV at great cost to no avail - except damaging Silbury Hill). They'd rather ignore the messenger (given that they're not allowed to shoot him). There are none so blind...



CROSS CULTURE COMMONALITIES By Lady Jane

uman beings have three things in common. For survival they require sustenance, shelter and sex. Whatever the culture humans recognise in each other the need to eat; though the individual cuisine might be as diverse as a portion of fish and chips to the witchetty grubs of the famous Bush Tucker trials.

Also all humans at some point require shelter from the elements. They might live stationary in permanent high rise garden bungalows. apartments to Alternatively, humans may live a nomadic lifestyle in temporary shelters constantly moving through necessity following their animals or to find water. Humans are extremely adaptable and are found in nearly every possible terrain but they do have limits. Even during leisure time they usually require some sort of shelter albeit in a five star hotel or roughing it under desperately trying to cook canvas, sausages over an open fire with an umbrella in the rain.

As for the third point even in the most primitive cultures humans have recognised the need for males and females in their society. This applies to either patriarch cal or matriarch cal led cultures. They might not have fully understood the biological mechanics but knew they needed both in order to reproduce and create new humans. Otherwise their community, complete with its relevant culture, would simply cease to exist.

So since these three things are an essential part of human survival why is it 'we' concentrate primarily on 'our' differences? Why pander to the old 'Us verses Them' concept.

Paganism encompasses a rich variety of beliefs and although we live in an officially Christian country we can practise reasonably openly even if we do get some strange looks. Over the years I have encountered different belief systems and cultures both at home and abroad. I admittedly have only mixed with the Pagan society in recent times. However, I have begun to observe in some quarters a veiled trend.

With slow recognition of the Pagan movement within the U.K we are under closer scrutiny. There are persons, particularly in the media, who cannot wait for us to 'Come a Cropper'.

Britain has had its fair share of religious wars and even in some localities today friction there is still between communities. We have learnt that when dealing with people outside the Pagan community to use discretion. To take an extreme example I doubt that anybody reading this article would make the mistake of offering a member of the Jewish or Muslim faith 'a nice piece of pork pie'! On the other hand I would not be personally offended if I was given a portion of Xmas Pud. Also I have on many occasions swapped Christmas cards with Christians, Muslims, Sikhs and Hindus.

Here the emphasis has been on wishing one another well for the season rather than the alleged birth of a Christian Icon.

I have been fortunate enough to have been introduced to various belief systems and even though I may not personally totally agree with what they may practice, I recognise that within each area there are certain core elements. Most of the Pagan beliefs systems, and I know I have not been introduced to all, do tend to have some sort of regard for the natural world. Rituals play a part even if it is only once in a blue moon. Food and drink often have an important role in the ritual. Offerings are often made to deities or elements. This can include something as simple as putting leftovers on the bird table. If there is not a sacred indoor space, a handy tree is often used for shelter.

As for reproduction I will leave that to the individual imagination but we do seem to be swelling in numbers. However, reproduction is not necessarily in this case restricted to the human race. In certain faiths there is a great emphasis on the planting, growing and reaping cycles of the year. As I said earlier, humans do need to eat.

I think the next time we automatically rush to defend our little corner of Paganism as being so much better than their area of Paganism we should pause a moment for thought. Do we really want to step on what is such a slippery slope? Aren't we in danger of replicating the historical mistakes of the external Pagan community?

To quote a well known piece of Shakespeare 'If you prick us do we not bleed?'

I think Paganism in the 21st Century should be above that. Don't you?

Morth Males Report

very merry Yule, Christmas and New Year to you all from your local coordinator. Feast, drink, laugh, make merry and celebrate the turning of the year, just as mankind has done for at least the past 10,000 years.

There are more ancient and prehistoric sites aligned to the Mid-Winter Solstice than there are towards the Mid-Summer Solstice, including one of this region's most ancient and sacred sites on Anglesey known as Bryn Celli Ddu. Although no bodies have ever been found inside it, it is still classified as either a passage tomb or a burial mound, which is a shame as this gives a totally in-accurate idea of what the monument is all about. As well as being lined up to the Winter Solstice, Bryn Celli Ddu also shows the Spring and Autumn Equinox. On top of that, once every 8 years the planet Venus shines through a small hole called the letter box and shines directly on the stone at the back of the chamber lighting it up with Venusian light, making this an amazingly accurate calendar. I'll try to find out when this will next occur and we could have a Pagan Fed outing to go and see it.

In fact, here in North Wales we are spoiled for ancient sites, they are all around us. On Anglesey alone there is Lligwy Comlech, Llyn Cerrig Bach; there are Standing Stones, Hut Circles, a Hillfort, Din Lligwy, Branwen's Cave, St. Seiriol's Well and Cell, plus more that I've forgotten and that's just on Ynys Mon. We also have two wonderful Stone Circles on the North Wales coast at Penmaenmawr called The Druid Circles (well worth a visit), then 5 miles NW of Mold is a lovely Stone Circle called Penbedw Park and near that is a whole batch of ancient sites including:

We have Standing Stones at Llanrhaeadrym-Mochnant and two Standing Stones at Llanfihangel. There is Carreg Lefn near Rhosgoch, Maen y Cleddau near Sylfaen Farm (SH632186). Then in St. Mary's Churchyard at Welshpool there is a massive Standing Stone.

This is by no means a complete list as that would take up the rest of this magazine, I just wanted to point out that we are very fortunate to be surrounded by these very ancient, prehistoric Sacred Pagan sites.

If a few people are interested then I propose that in the Spring or Summer we visit some of these. Please let me know if you might like to join us and I'll see if there is a circular route we could take to include as many of these as possible.

As far as the actual North Wales report goes, I'll just say that the Wrexham and Rhyl Moots are still going but if you wish to attend either of these please take a look at the Facebook page beforehand to

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see what's happening. For Wrexham look up 'The Wrexham Pagan Federation Moot' and for Rhyl it's simply 'Rhyl Moot', or you can contact me either by e-mail at offasring@gmail.com or phone 01691 679066 (I'll be away from 20th until 29th December), or just ask on the site.

I'm always happy to receive any comments, ideas, suggestions, questions or complaints.



The Art of Astrology By Steve Ludford

K then folks, in the last issue I promised to tackle Mars, Jupiter and Saturn so here goes.

Now <u>Mars</u> is one Planet I'm sure you all know something about. For a start we all know that it's known as the red Planet. Why

red? Well partly because it red and partly because red is the colour of blood and associated with war. Mars is the God of war, but don' let that put you off as it is also the Planet of energy, strength, positivism, liveliness and Without vitality. its influence we would all become very lazv apathetic. We say that Venus is the Female Planet of Love and we also say

that Mars is the Male Planet of action and movement. Your energy levels will be largely determined by the position of Mars in your personal birth chart (you can get this information from either https://alabe.com/freechart, http://astro.cafeastrology.com or

www.psychicscience.org/astrochart.aspx.

There are also other sites which are equally as good, just type in 'free birth chart' and you'll find loads, or you can just ask me. Some of these sites will also give you a brief analysis of your chart which should be reasonably accurate).

The symbol we use for the Female is the same as the symbol for Venus and likewise the symbol we use for the Male is the Mars symbol. This is reflected in the fact that Mars rules the muscular system and the gonads or sex glands. This is an extension of the Planets

general association with physical sexual expression.

In the physical world Mars causes accidents, violence and fevers. But if we could see the growth of the Ego, if we could trace its history, we would find that impulse and rash

action in the past has brought its inevitable reaction in accident or fever, for every effort has its cause. There are no mishaps or misadventures which could not be traced to a cause set in motion by the Ego in the past.

When Mars is weak in any chart it gives cowardice or faint-heartedness, which may lead to criminal tendencies. A cruel and

brutal nature is often the result of a weak and uncontrolled Martian nature.

In the horoscope and in the outer world, Mars represents a person who is active, strong, energetic and muscular; of average height, not usually tall. The hair is often red

but not invariably so and is often curly or wiry. Of average proportions, often more slender than stout. Eyes are usually hazel, quick and observant. Perceptive faculties as a rule are more developed than the reflective.

The trades associated with this Planet are those of a soldier, sailor, surgeon, dentist, coroner, lawyer or chemist. While all workers in iron, fire and metals generally and all who use knives, edged tools or weapons, such as barbers, reapers, butchers, sportsmen, carpenters etc. come more or less under 12

the rule of Mars.

The parts of the body signified by Mars are the head (especially the forehead and nose), outer sex organ, lower bowel and bladder, the gall bladder and to some extent the muscles, sinews and arterial system.

Enough about Mars, let's move onto Jupiter -

the giant of the Solar system.

The keyword for Jupiter will always be 'expansion'. Everything about Jupiter points towards expansion in every aspect. In the Zodiac it rules over Sagittarius and in old astrology it ruled Pisces also (now attributed to Neptune). It works well in Cancer but not in Gemini.

It is associated with knowledge, advanced studies, a philosophical outlook, speculative thinking, religion, universities, foreign countries, languages and book publication. On the body, it rules the liver.

The positive qualities of Jupiter include optimism, generosity, loyalty, joviality, a kind nature, a sense of justice and compassion, breadth of vision, well directed mental powers, a flair for languages and good at sport.

On the negative side Jupiter can lead to being blindly optimistic, an extremist, wasteful, self indulgent, a gambler, extravagant, lawless and unbalanced in beliefs.

Jupiter is the thinking-person's Planet. As the guardian of the abstract mind, this Planet rules higher learning, and bestows upon us a yen for exploring ideas, both intellectually and spiritually. Intellectually speaking, Jupiter assists us in formulating our ideology.

In the more spiritual realm, Jupiter rules over religions and philosophy. A search for the answers is what Jupiter proposes, and if it means spanning the globe to find them, well, that's probably why Jupiter also rules long-distance travel. In keeping with this theme, Jupiter compels us to assess our ethical and moral values; it also addresses

our sense of optimism.

Luck and good fortune are associated with Jupiter for good reason. This is a kind and benevolent Planet, one that wants us to grow and flourish in a positive way. Jupiter may be judge and jury, but it's mostly an honourable helpmate, seeing to it that we're on the right path. While our success, accomplishments and prosperity are all

within Jupiter's realm, this largesse can, at times, deteriorate into laziness and sloth (Jupiter, at its worst, is associated with weight gain!). More often than not, however, Jupiter will guide us down the primrose path.

Leisure time is also one of Jupiter's pastimes. Sports of all kinds, games of chance and a stroll in the park with the family pet (Jupiter loves animals) - these are all ruled by this Planet. Finally, Jupiter often presages great wealth, material and otherwise. This is a good friend in the heavens!

It takes Jupiter about 12 years to circle the Zodiac (the Planet visits an average of one sign a year).

Right, onto Saturn.

As the most distant of the visible Planets, Saturn signifies the boundaries of personal awareness and experience. Astrologically, it depicts the finite limit to our own perceptions, capabilities and life; 12

A the fixed outroms against which again

the fixed extremes against which personal will-power and self determination prove futile. The archetypal figure of the stoic oldman in his deathly shroud portrays the unmoving end which awaits us all, regardless of whether or not we are prepared for it. Death, after all, is an extremely limiting experience.

Saturn's Much οf astrological interpretation can traced t o its astronomical appearance and movement. As the outermost Planet, extremes and boundaries of any kind fall under its influence: from mundane significations ranging from gateposts, doors, thresholds and walls, international borders. skins, leather, nails and

hair, to the signification of personal limits imposed by fear, self-doubt, weakness and lack of resources. Though the Universe extends immeasurably beyond what can be seen by the naked eye, once a Planet has passed outside the range of human comprehension, its influence becomes impersonal. Liz Greene calls Saturn

"the membrane which separates the personal unconscious from the collective unconscious". It is the final Planet to bring its influence to bear directly in our daily lives and observably in the structures that define our world. It has no interest in transpersonal awareness, higher philosophies or intangible collectives; its focus is realism and it stands as the absolute testimony to the need to honour reality as defined by common sense.

Saturn is the slowest moving of the traditional Planets, completing its cycle around the Sun every 29-30 years. It is also dim and unimpressive to view. Both its lacklustre appearance and its sluggish motion

have contributed to astrological signification over old age and poor vitality, as well as a careful, determined and slow but disciplined approach. There is no heat and fire in the characteristics of Saturn, no burning passion or inflamed desire, its movement is deliberate, steady and predictable. In traditional texts it is known as the Greater

Malefic because it is placed furthest from the creative warmth of the and fertile Sun the moisture of the Earth and Moon. Its qualities are therefore defined as 'cold and dry', conditions that antipathetic are growth and healthy development. Standing on the perimeter of our personal cosmos it is also considered dark, incapable of receiving or generating m u c h

luminosity. The absence of light further defines it as heavy, inclined to fall or weigh down - gravity and grave are two words that respond directly to its essentially serious, ponderous and sombre nature.

Thus Saturn has a natural rulership over places and conditions that are cold, dark, oppressive, or defined through weakness, decay or hard physical labour. It is the lord of winter, the enemy of the Sun, the symbol for the authoritarian father or the unswerving law caster who cares less about spirit of personal morality obedience to structures that serve collective purpose. Saturn calls for loss, denial and sacrifice wherever our immediate ego-driven interests conflict with wider needs or our own future evolution. As the 'Grim Reaper', Saturn appears to be only concerned with bringing denial to our hopes and expectations, but as 'Father Time' we understand the purpose is to order the individual to be subservient to their society



and their own spiritual destiny; to recognize that their life at any given time is only a small part of a much wider scheme; to safeguard the continuation of existence and ensure that subsequent generations will thrive and prosper. Saturn is often linked with history, traditions and the past, but it is every bit as concerned about the future. Everything that arises from its influence carries the aim of creating firmer foundations for future potential. Ancient depictions often show Saturn holding the Uroboros (or Ouroboros) - the serpent who eats its own tail, a symbol of eternal regeneration which forges birth and death into the endless cycle of past, present and future.

Saturn rules Capricorn and traditionally Aquarius (now attributed to Uranus) it works well in Libra but not in Cancer. It is associated with the skin and teeth, bones, the spleen and acid formation in the joints. It also governs old age, preservation, perseverance, slow change, the cold, inhibition, restriction and intolerance.

In the Jewish theosophy known as the Qabalah, Saturn is the third sphere of divine activity called Binah - Understanding or Intelligence. This is the power which organises the creative forces and imposes form on the Universe. It is thus the root of matter. It is also the Female Principle, for it is through conception and birth that we acquire material form. Binah is the Great Mother, The Primal Ocean from whence we all originate. In a sense you could say that Venus represents the Virgin, The Moon represents the Pregnant Mother and Saturn represents the Crone. Although it is also true to say that all three Planets represent the different aspects within themselves.

Where are the Planets between now and Spring?

- ◆ The Sun. The exact time of the Winter Solstice (when the Sun enters Capricorn) this year is 04:48 GMT on 22nd December 2015 and travels through Capricorn to reach Aquarius by 21st January then onward to Pisces by 19th February. The Sun remains in Pisces until the Spring Equinox on 20th March.
- The Moon. Please see page 2 for the Lunar Phases.
- Mercury is half way through Capricorn as the Sun enters it at the Solstice and reaches the end of that sign and the start of Aquarius on 2nd January. It then turns retrograde and re-enters Capricorn on the 9th January, going back to 15 degrees when it starts forward motion again and reaches the end of Capricorn by 13th February. From there Mercury travels through Aquarius and reaches Pisces on 6th March. At the Spring Equinox on March 21st, Mercury is just entering Aries so is very close to the Sun.
- Venus is situated 18 degrees into Scorpio at the Solstice and reaches the end of that sign and the start of Sagittarius on 30th December. It travels through that sign and reaches Capricorn on 24th January. Continuing its way, it then reaches Aquarius by 17th February. Venus is travelling quite fast now and reaches the next sign (Pisces) on 12th March. By the Equinox, Venus is 11 degrees into Pisces.
- ◆ Mars is 22 degrees into Libra at the Winter Solstice and reaches its next sign (Scorpio) on 4th January. From there it travels through that sign to reach Sagittarius by 6th March. By the Equinox, Mars is 5 degrees into that sign.
- ◆ Jupiter is 22 degrees into Virgo as we start but only reaches 25 degrees on the 7th January before going back to 16 degree by the Equinox.
- Saturn is 10 degrees into Sagittarius at the Solstice and only reaches 22 degrees by the Equinox.

- Uranus is 16 degrees into Aries at the Solstice and will only travel a few degrees to reach 19 degrees by the Equinox.
- Neptune is 7 degrees Pisces at the Solstice and reaches 10 degrees by the Equinox.
- Pluto starts 14 degrees Capricorn and ends at 17 degrees.

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
