Wales and H. & W. could no longer continue - he has added N. Wales to his Regional workload, and H. & W. to ours! So we apologose in advance for the odd inevitable hold-up, as between Steve and ourselves we now cover the whole of Wales, and every county bordering on or even near it! Of course, any region is only as 'lively' as its members, so if any of you have any moots/groups going, idead for get-togethers', or news/views/articles etc., get in touch and share them with us!

News from the PF itself is that due to last November's conference not making the anticipated profit, things are not too healthy financially; so we in the Regions have had to look to ways of funding much f our own Regional Magazines. Mike and I are pleased to report that the (very small) camp-out profit was boosted by the sale of (good) 2nd hand books (a list of books still available printed elsewhere in this issue of 'Drops'), but we will need further events/fundraising ideas to continue indefinitely......Please come forward!

Our district is now starting 'District Council Meetings', as the Districts in general are becoming more automomous and devolving from Central. This is in general a good idea as several items are now being discussed at District rather than at National level, which means you can have your say (by post, or in person) and be listened to! However, this is still very much in the embryo stage and dates/venues are still being sorted out as we write this. For those interested in attending future meetings, a quick line or phone call to us should give you the information.

You may remembet a debate over the past couple of years about the "Three Principles" of the Pagan Federation. Views were sought at all levels (some of the 'older' members would have had a questionnaire from our predecessors (60 sent out, 3 replies (I)) and have discussed it at various moots etc.) Now the PF have responded, as follows:

"AMENDMENTS TO THE THREE PRINCIPLES":

"For the past year, a PF Council sub-committee, consisting of Prudence Jones (chair), Vivianne Crowley, Val Bannister, Jem Dowse and John MaCintyre, has been considering the question of whether the three Principles of the PF should be changed and, if so, in what way. Extensive consultations with members, and consideration of the views of non-members, led to the conclusion that, while the meaning of the existing principles was perfectly satisfactory, some modification of the wording was desirable. The sub-committee presented its report at the Council meeting on 12-6-99 and, following further discussion, the following were adopted as the new Principles by the two-thirds majority necessary for amendments to the Constitution:

(S) LOVE FOR AND KINSHIP WITH NATURE. REVERENCE FOR THE LIFE FORCE AND ITS EVER-RENEWING CYCLES OF LIFE AND DEATH.

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2) A POSITIVE MORALITY, IN WHICH THE INDIVIDUAL IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE DISCOVERY AND DEVELOPMENT OF THEIR TRUE NATURE IN HARMONY WITH THE OUTER WORLD AND COMMUNITY.

THIS IS OFTEN EXPRESSED AS 'DO WHAT YOU WILL, AS LONG AS IT HARMS NONE'.

3) RECOGNITION OF THE DIVINE, WHICH TRANSCENDS GENDER, ACKNOWLEDGING BOTH THE FEMALE

AND MALE ASPECTS OF DEITY.

While acceptance of the three Principles is a requirement for membership of the PF, they are not, and are not intended to be, an authoritative definition of Paganism. They do give a broad indication of 'mainstream' pagan

attitudes, and are useful in explaining Paganism to outsiders."

John Macintyre, who kindly provided us with this write-up, would like to thank allwho contributed to the debate. We ourselves feel that few could argue with the revisions; while not materially changing the '3 P's', the wording has been clarified in a way that should make them acceptable to many more Pagans of all paths, especially 'non-Wiccans'.

One last small news - Pagan Dawn may be a little late, as a new Editor still has to be settled.....Any offers?

So, with our apologies for the formality of the 'Co-ords Corn' this time (I), Mike and I would like to wish you all

the blessings of the coming 'first fruits' - may all your endeavours bear good fruit!

REGIONAL REVIEWS

The Gathering (#2), Lampeter, Saturday 13th March

&In 1998 a number of all-day events were staged around the Mid and South Wales PF region. These events were designed to bring people together to meet, exchange ideas. scelebrate and generally have a good time (and also to raise funds for Drops). Lampeters Pagan Society organised the Gathering (#1) with great success. The Gathering (#2) helds on Saturday 13th March can be equally praised. The event drew many of the people who came last year, as well as many new faces from around the region. In addition, only in Lampeter on that day could you have been exposed to four high quality talks or workshops Gareth's talk about candle magic took a broad approach about how we think about magic. He covered a range of issues about using magic with candles, including the practicalities of where to buy them. The second talk, presented by David, concentrated upon astrology as energy. Through the masterly use of a white board, David introduced a few of the principles that structure astrology. His talk ended the morning session, and everyone very hungrily went to the shared lunch. As always, everyone's generosity meant there was believed that the shared lunch. aplenty to eat and leftovers for tea and the after ritual feast. The afternoon began promptly and Jen, a Lampeter postgraduate, presented a talk about Kali, a Hindu Goddess. The afternoon sessions finished with Ken's meditation and music? Sworkshop. 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Earth Healing Day, Powys, Saturday 17th April

Hello and thank you to Powys and the Borders! On Saturday 17th April the regional Earth Healing Day was held 'somewhere' near Knighton. Kindly a Pagan Federation member had Soffered a piece of land to be the ritual site. It had recently been a cleared coniferous plantation and in the process of being restored to a deciduous wood. The site appeared to be badly scarred with remnants of trees and the obvious markings of heavy machinery However, lulling in the bracken there was a certian peace. Looking down the valley its steep sides fromed a 'V' with a stream running through the bottom and in the distance the rolling hills of the borders meeting between with the sun shining warmly. There was an opportunity to look round the land as the actual ritual did not begin until 4 o' clock. By four about twenty or so people had gathered. A small group from the local area exploring the Celtic tradition had prepared and conducted the ritual (with some help). The ritual expresented an opportunity to meditate upon our own environmental concerns as well as affirming our collective intent to heal the earth. The ritual culminated in a very evocative spiral chant, raising our energy and sending it out. We stayed around after the ritual feasting together, getting to know each other and talking. Needless to say draggings ourselves away proved difficult (especially with the editor of 'Drops' who just knows too (many people). For me, Earth Healing Day is not just embodied in the ritual but in the process of coming together regionally and also nationally. Earth Healing Day is about and recognition of how artificial our divisions are, especially when we divide according to parcels of land (and the dangers of those excluded imprinted at this time in the Rewspapers about Kosovo). We dismiss responsibility because it is not in our (so-called) back yard. What Earth Healing Day affirms, for me, is that we all share a planet that suffers because of these very divisions. And what a welcomed opportunity to visit a new part of the PF region, as well as the opportunity to meet those in the PF region sharing our border.

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BUNNY HUGGERS UNITE

When I wrote a similar article to this one, about animal welfare and its relationship to a modern pagan lifestyle, for another magazine some time ago, I was accused of being some type of raving Nazi veggie trying to force all pagans to eat lentils and nettle soup (sounds awful!). In fact my real purpose was, and still is, to highlight the sadistic cruelty inflicted on our animal kindred by human animals in factory farming, medical research, zoos circuses, testing weapons and blood sports. Rightly or wrongly, I believe that this is something that pagans especially should be aware of as part of their belief system.

As regards the wider issue of vegetarion or vegan diets, this is entirely a personal choice and has never been, and I hope never will be, a prerequisite for a pagan belief or lifestyle. What however is a fact is that, at present, health factors such as BSE/CJD, e-coli, salmonella, research linking cancer and heart disease with red meat, and concern about factory farming methods are encouraging more people to change their long established eating

habits.

I am quite happy to accept that if we time-warped back 10,000 years we would find our pagan ancestors happily munching mammoth steaks and hunting the last woolly rhino to extinction. Great, but this is not the type of society we live in today, or the type of paganism we are practising. We are living in the Microchip Age, not the Stone Age. As far as I am aware the average office worker does not go out after a hard day slaving over the word-processor to the local park to kill a deer for dinner. Word has not reached me of shamanic rites in Swansea for a successful shopping trip to Tesco!

Some of the old hunting magick still lingers on in a symbolic way in the modern Craft. However it needs to be viewed in the context of today's society and not from the atavistic perspective of the distant prehistoric past. Old Herne is still the male leader of the Wild Hunt and Diana/Holda still has her pack of hunting hounds. I can still invoke the Wild Hunter without hypocrisy. Why? Because his archetypal image represents the hunter of human souls who gathers in the dead and guides them across the alder bridge to the Castle of Roses.

As modern pagans teetering on the brink of the 21st century and living in the Western world we no longer have to go our and hunt down our dinner with spears, so therefore we also do not have to take these ancient images as literally as our prehistoric forebears did. They lived in a totally different society which we find hard to imagine and with a cultural ethos which is not our. Today the God and Goddess are more likely to be invoked as the protectors and guardians of abused pets and endangered species than as hunting deities in the old sense. The old hunting rituals and ethos still survives among native peoples worldwide, but it is different again from modern methods of food production, which treats animals as consumer products, or the wasteful killing of animals for pleasure in blood sports. Ancient peoples offered prayers to the spirit of the animals they hunted for food and clothing. They also had a more symbiotic relationship with wildlife and nature which they recognized objects to be used and abused. The present-day foxhunter and badger baiter who hunts for a sick and sadistic opleasure cannot be compared with the ancient hunter who did it so they could survive from day to day.

I am puzzled by those who advocate a spiritual belief system based on the sacredness of life and respect for nature and Mother Earth, yet appear to ignore or condone the senseless cruelty inflicted on the Mother's

creatures. There is something definitely odd and wrong here.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN

On Wednesday 11th August Britain will witness a total eclipse of the sun for the first time since 1927, the next one won't be until 2090 so it is fair to call this event a once in a lifetime happening! Although total eclipses of the sun do take place about every 18 months at differing places on the earth, any one point on the earth will only be in the path of totality about once every 360 years.

A solar eclipse (in case you don't know!) happens when the moon lies between the sun and the earth, with the moon masking the sun. The moon and sun will appear to be almost the same size, this is due to the elliptical orbits of the moon and earth, which means that the apparent sizes of these heavenly bodies changes. Sometimes the moon appears smaller, and sometimes larger, than the sun. It is only when the

apparent size of the moon is larger than the sun that a total eclipse can occur.

The path of totality will cover Cornwall and South Devon, but everywhere in the UK will witness a partial eclipse that will last for about two and a half hours. This PF region of south and mid Wales will see about 95 - 97 percent of the sun eclipsed, which should be pretty dramatic. If you are thinking about going down to Cornwall for the event be aware that you may experience many difficulties. For months now we have been warned that if you haven't got any accomodation booked, then forget it. But only a few weeks ago radio reports were saying that bookings were actually down with people deliberately staying away from the South West in August. Although this may sound encouraging, I would expect that on the day (or week!) the place will be packed, as those who are more likely to go see the eclipse (just to generalise a bit here!) will not be those who generally stay in hotels, those who get called 'New Age enough - to brave the crowds so that I can see the whole thing) make sure you leave plenty of travelling time, and take plenty of provisions with you, and don't count on moving round Cornwall when you get there, unless you've got a bike!

Pagans in Cornwall are understandably concerned about the effect on their surroundings, especially the many sacred sites in the area. Just the sheer numbers of people who might turn up on the day and want to witness the eclipse from a sacred site could cause havoc, if not great amounts of damage. If you feel that you would like to be somewhere sacred on the day, it is probably best to contact the Pagan Federation

who will put you in contact with members in the South West who have organised events.

By the time August comes around you will probably have heard/read more than enough about the eclipse, so I won't bore you here. Wherever you are, enjoy it! If you do want more information try these:



Within the circle of the earth and the great mothers arms



Book Review

Matthews, C. (ed. 1990) Voices of the Goddess: A Chorus of Sibyls. Wellingborough, Northamptonshire: ,
The Aquarian Press.

Sibyls, as Matthews says in her introduction, are mediators or channels for the voices of the gods. This pedited collection combines the voices of ten women who express and communicate their lives as the voices of the Goddess. What I like about this, and also the other edited collections by Matthews, is its inclusiveness (although with a strong connection to the Fellowship of Isis which obviously acts as an important node of meeting). There are a variety of 'voices' from Britain to america, from Witch to artist. and from the light to the darker aspects of the Goddess expressed in their lives. Each one centres around the themes of how they came to relate to the Goddess, and what it means in their lives. As with other books I have reviewed, this connection with an actual living and breathing relationship rather than poresentation of a system of beliefs is something I find deeply challenging as well as desiring to explore this further. I suppose this is the danger of such a book. The book presents ten stories of women who have been deeply transformed by their relationship with the Goddess and the aspects and archetypes they identify with. this often combines with various forms of activism and political projects. In part these are stories about 'great' women. Why not, it counters many, many more books about 'great' men. I amo concerned that 'normal' women, and also 'normal' men seeking the feminine are lost, but the honesty of the edited collection makes connections and builds bridges. It is a book that is possible to relate to, than revere, and provides inspiration, not alienation. Overall a thoroughly good book, not about Sibyls, but of Sibyls - women who continue to mediate the Goddess in these very pages.

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GODDESS 2000 PROJECT

Goddess 2000 Project - "A Goddess on Every Block!" is a Grass roots community based Goddess art project. Thousands of pagans and others who honour the Earth are preparing to welcome the year 2000 by creating large goddess statues and paintings all over the country [i.e. the USA]. Groups in other countries are also participating. Full details are available at the official 'Goddess 2000 Project' Web sites at www.goddess2000.org

This year, all over the world, pagan groups, circles, and solitary folks will be making artwork that celebrates and honours the Goddess and the Green Man. The project already has participants in Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Denmark, England, Finland, Germany, Iceland, India, Indonesia, Ireland, New Zealand, The Netherlands, Norway, Puerto Rico, the Philippines, Singapore Scotland, South Africa, Sweden, Wales and the US. There are now over 156 contacts and co-ordinators in 26 countries.

This is the largest outpouring of Goddess Imagery seen in the past 3,000 years!

The official kick-off for this year long project was December 21st 1998. Already many people have responded, and statues are being made in wood, plaster, concrete, clay, paper, textiles and metal. Paintings, collages, murals and labyrinths are also being made.

Winter solstice 1999 will be celebrated with community 'Dancing the Goddess Home' Spiral Dances, around the world, and the dedication of the 'Goddess 2000 Project' tributes to the Goddess. Original music, rituals and dances are being created especially for this event.
