

Imbolc Guided Meditation

Make yourself comfortable and close your eyes.

Take a few deep breaths and be aware of the ground beneath you, of your general surroundings, and of any everyday noises in the background. As you relax you see a white mist forming in the corners of your vision, a white mist that gradually thickens and swirls around you;



blocking out the space you are in, blocking out any other people. A thick white mist that envelops you, surrounds you, and hides everything around you. You are alone and safe in this thick white mist.

As the mist clears you find yourself sat on grass, it is dawn, and the ground is covered in dew. The first rays of the sun are beginning to reach out and touch the sky and the landscape around you. Take a few deep breaths of the cold crisp air and listen to the birds singing. You stand up and stretch and notice a path nearby, you walk along this path looking around you, noticing trees, plants and any animals. A few snowdrops are nestling in patches, their white flowers heralding the beginning of spring.

Walking along the path you feel that you have come this way before, it feels familiar, and you become aware that you know what is just up ahead, a sacred space that you alone know of. Sure enough, as you perhaps turn a corner, or come to the crest of a hill, you see in front of you a special sacred space. Stand for a moment and look at it. What do you see? Is it a grove of trees, a waterfall, a temple made of stones or rocks? It is your space, your special sacred space, see how it looks in the early morning light.

You walk towards the sacred area and when you reach what might be called its entrance you pause and consider for a moment all the everyday baggage and stress you normally carry around with you. Today you do not wish to taint your sacred space with all this stuff, so you make a decision to leave it behind you, at the entrance. Symbolically you may wish to take off your clothes and leave them in a pile before walking into your sacred space, or perhaps you have an actual bag with you that you want to leave at the entrance. Once inside you feel light and happy and free, you are not weighed down with burdens and worries, you are a child of the light and are glad to be alive.

You notice that there is water within your space, this may be a pool or a stream, or simply a bowl of water. You want to engage with the water and so you walk over to it; you might drink it, wash with it, swim in it, feel the cold clear liquid against your skin and feel refreshed at its touch.

After the exhilarating touch of the water you feel a little cold and looking around you notice a white robe lying ready for you and so you put it on. You feel clean and warm and fresh, it is the beginning of a new day, and a new start in your life. You turn to your altar; this may be of stone, complete with elaborate tools, or it may be a fallen log, or a simple rock, whatever it is you walk up to it and find three candles by it. Take each candle in turn, light it, and place it on the altar, as you do so make three wishes: One for yourself, one for a friend, and one for the world in general. You sit and watch the candles burning for a while, thinking about your wishes.

It is now time to leave, if there is anything you wish to do before you go, do it now.

As you walk out of your sacred space you notice the pile of crumpled clothes, or bag, at the entrance. What do you wish to do with them? Perhaps you are willing to put them back on, or perhaps you wish to burn them or bury them. The choice is yours.


Once you have done what is right for you, begin to walk back along the path you came down. Once again noticing the plant life and animals around you, listening to the birdsong, and feeling joy in the world around you.

When you reach the place where your journey began sit down on the grass again, look around at the scenery. You now notice that a white mist is forming.

A white mist that envelops you and thickens to block out all your surroundings, until it is just you, alone and safe in this thick white mist.

When the mist begins to clear once more you find yourself back in the place you started, be aware of the ground beneath you, of everyday sounds, and feel yourself truly back in your body.

Take a few deep breaths, and when you are ready you may open your eyes.

Gog & Magog, near Glastonbury, Somerset

Our next planned pilgrimage will start soon, and take until September 2019 to complete. It will be walked in stages of about 50 miles each. This will take us along the Meridian running north of Glastonbury (Somerset) from Stonedown/Gog and Magog area (to be dowsed), approximately 2 degrees 41' west. This pilgrimage will finish at Glassonby/Lazonby in Cumbria, near Long Meg and her Daughters. The route will go via Tintern, Kymin Naval Temple above Monmouth, Blackwardine Crossroads (where Alfred Watkins had his initial vision of Leys), Dinedor Serpent, Queen Eleanor's Bower east of Shrewsbury, Whitchurch, and so on up to Shap in Cumbria.

Local Pagans are welcome to join us at various points along the route, or even the whole journey. Anyone backpacking the entire distance will need to be fit, or perhaps motorists might help by transporting the backpacks some of the way?

We are thinking of walking the Marches (Wales-England borders) in the Spring of next year, after the floods.

During my working life in Romania I was a police dog. Chasing hardened criminals was all in a day's work. Nobody messed with me.



HOT CROSS BUNS.

According to the Oxford Companion to Food, (an encyclopaedia about food published by the Oxford University Press in 1999) marking a cross on the bun is of ancient origin, connected with religious offerings of bread. The Egyptians used to offer small round cakes marked with an image of the horns of an ox, to the goddess of the moon. The Saxons ate buns marked with a cross in honour of the goddess of light, Eostre, whose name was transferred to Easter.

Today, the cross on the bun is associated with Christianity and signifies the crucifixion, however, if you look at the cross you notice the lines are equal (unlike the Christian cross) and many believe it actually symbolises the four seasons and/or the four phases of the moon.



Another Alternative to Plastic!

Clingfilm has many uses and helps make life easier, especially in the kitchen, but it still ends up being fodder for the landfill!

Have you considered the natural alternative—HONEY!

I was dubious at first, but bought some ready-made honey wraps and found them easy to use. The honey wrap keeps my bread fresh and I use

them to cover open biscuit packets so the biscuits remain crisp. They can be used to cover bowls of food too, but don't use them to wrap raw meat/chicken or fish.

The honey wrap seals to itself by the warmth of your hands, and unlike plastic, is natural so your food is safe from plastic contaminants. You can even fold the wraps to make a sealable bag to store food such as nuts. However, I personally don't think they are suitable to carry in your bag or pocket because the slightly sticky outside of the wrap could pick up fluff etc.

Because honey wraps are made with cotton fabric the food can "breathe" thus keeping fresh for longer. The wraps can be washed in cold water with a little bit of soap and just hung up to dry, then they are ready to use again.

And when the wraps are completely used up, you can pop them on your compost as all the ingredients and material is biodegradable.

When my current wraps wear out, I'm going to have a go at making my own.

If you want to find out more, just search online for "honey wraps". There's some good "YouTube" tutorials on making your own too.

CALLING ALL DRUIDS!

"The World Druidry Survey"

Contemporary Druidry is relatively new as a religious/spiritual path, and is still in the process of defining itself as a global movement. Several books have been written about the history of contemporary Druidry, but there is not much research, yet, focused on what it really means to be a Druid in the modern age.

The World Druidry Survey explores the ways in which Druidry, as a globalizing path of nature spirituality, is evolving both in the traditional lands of the ancient Druids, and elsewhere, as it spreads and takes root in other countries and cultures of the world. As we, the practicing Druids of the world, learn and grow and develop our personal paths of Druidry, what do we continue to hold in common? In what ways do our practices and beliefs diversify? What, if anything, forms the spiritual, common core of contemporary World Druidry?

Whether you are just beginning your journey on the Path of Druidry, or whether you have been a practicing Druid for decades, your experiences and perspective are important to this work. I hope you will share a bit of your story!

I am undertaking this study as an independent scholar and educator, with over 25 years' experience using mixed research methods to shed light on the ways in which people learn, grow, and change, under the influence of changing educational contexts and cultures. I am also a fellow Druid, supported by a grant from the OBOD's Mt. Haemus Awards program. The research findings from this study are to be published as part of the OBOD's Mt. Haemus Award program, at Beltane 2021, and presented at Mt. Haemus Day 2024, in addition to other publications and venues yet to be determined.

Pagan Aid has gone through a bit of a transformation during 2018 and has started 2019 with a new approach and new project.

The charity was set up in 2015 to raise funds for environmental and social projects that support and honour the sacredness of the Earth. It has donated £1000s to various charities and projects since then but has now taken a slightly different approach.

A membership scheme was launched in late 2018, with members being able to suggest projects that the charity might raise funds for. The scheme, although in its infancy, is proving popular with supporters. The small membership fee allows the charity to pay for its overheads so that all the money raised for its projects goes to the project.

Alongside the new membership scheme, the charity has embraced the culture of crowdfunding. It launched its first crowdfunding project in January 2019 to raise £1000 through crowdfunding to help with the next phase of **Patrick McCullom's India Environmental Project.** McCullom's project so far has worked to try to save the environment and the animals of India threatened by India's entry onto the global economic stage. Working with Jane Goodall, the first stage was teaching children of the importance of protecting animals and the environment.

The second part was the **Save the Ganges Cremation Project** with the designing and promoting new furnaces for Hindu cremations with greatly reduced or zero wood. Instead of depositing the ashes into the Ganges as per custom, a pot containing a seedling tree is provided whose dirt is combined with the ashes and a small amount of Ganges River water to be planted.

The current phase is to bring indigenous leaders to the next Kumbh Mela where 130 million people will be gathered. These leaders will be teaching the importance of 'original instructions', how the Earth is sacred and how our actions affect all life. Their teachings will be both environmental and spiritual and will be given to the biggest gathering of people that has ever happened.

Snowdrops



Their scientific name is *Galanthus*, which translates as 'milk flower'. Other names are: 'February fairmaids' and 'Candlemas bells'. Although seen to symbolise purity and hope, folklore also states that bringing a single Snow-drop into your home will bring ill-fortune, hence it's other name, 'death flower' which could mean it causes your milk to sour and eggs to spoil.

Snowdrops aren't native to the UK. Historians believe they were introduced from Europe in the late 15th century for Elizabethan gardens. They were

first recorded growing in the wild in the 1770's.

There's 20 species of wild Snowdrop. *Galanthus nivalis* is the most common. Over 1000 new varieties have been cultivated from these 20 species, however, Snowdrops can also create new varieties by cross-fertilisation. One of which is *Galanthus 'Ailwyn'*, discovered at Anglesey Abbey in Cambridgeshire in 1994.

Snowdrops contain an alkaloid called *galantamine*, which has been used to help manage mild to moderate cases of Alzheimer's.

Snowdrops may look delicate, but they have a hard tip that helps them break through the frozen ground. Their sap contains a type of antifreeze which helps protect them from frost.

Bees love snowdrops as they're a vital source of nectar early in the year.



The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)



On 25th May 2018 the **UK data privacy law (GDPR)** came into effect. We need your consent to continue sending you occasional emails related to your membership of the Mid-West and Wales District, our quarter-ly magazine, "Myddle Earth" and any relevant updates.

The General Data Protection Regulation, known as GDPR, is a positive step towards you having more control over how your data is used and how you're contacted. The changes will also help to better protect your personal data.

What is GDPR?

GDPR stands for General Data Protection Regulation. It creates a single set of rules that better protects personal information for people across the EU.

What information is being collected by the Mid-West and Wales District of the Pagan Federation: Personal details (names, address and contact details) from membership applications.

Where the information collected comes from: When you register as a Member of the Mid-West and Wales District of the Pagan Federation; talk to us on the phone, via email, or with contact forms on the website.

Why do we collect information: For use in maintaining your membership, and contacting you about any issues, and to send you our Member's quarterly magazine, "Myddle Earth" and advise you of any updates regarding membership and the MW&W District.

Who will information be shared with: We don't share your information with anyone other than the Pagan Federation.

How to get a copy of your personal information: You can access your personal information we hold by emailing the District Managers specifying exactly what you require at mwaw.dm@paganfederation.co.uk.

Letting us know if your personal information is incorrect : You have the right to question any information we have about you that you think is wrong or incomplete.
